Bow Arts buys its first building, creating 70 new artist studios and guaranteeing the provision of affordable creative workspace in east London



27-year-old arts charity Bow Arts has purchased its first ever building, creating 70 new affordable studios for artists, designers and makers and a permanent home for its educational arts services and community focused public programming in east London.

The purchase ensures Bow Arts' legacy and ongoing support for east London's artists, as well as its provision of sustainable and accessible creative opportunities for the area's young people and communities, as all the charity's current buildings – including their current Bow Road HQ – are rented.

Looking over the River Lea as it approaches Stratford, Three Waters sits where the three waters of Bow Creek, the River Lea and Limehouse Cut meet at Bow Locke, a stone's throw away from Bow Arts' first home in Bow. The first of its kind in London, part of the site occupies ground floor space of Peabody and Mount Anvil's new residential block, marrying the need for affordable housing and creative workspace in east London.

Owning Three Waters ensures Bow Arts can continue its 27 years of creating opportunities to work, learn and enjoy the arts across London, as well as supporting creatives to further their career and professionalise their practice. Through this purchase they can guarantee affordable, lifelong access to the arts in east London, London's historic artist quarter, and continue to nurture the area's unique and diverse creativity and talent. Three Waters will open early 2023.
