Bow Arts' renowned festival of film *Visions* continues with Webb-Ellis's Programme 2, presenting their new film *This place is a message* (2022), which imagines a world in which young people are seers and prophets, guiding us through our turbulent times.

British/Canadian filmmakers Caitlin and Anj Webb-Ellis are known for their unique and boundary-pushing methods of collaboration and working, and their latest film is no exception. In the film they co-create an imaginary world with young people from Gravesend, presenting an alternative environment for learning that pushes the limits of human expression and communication, making space for the body to speak, protest and disobey.

The film is presented in the Nunnery Gallery flanked by banners made by the young people in the film, with the furniture used in the apocalyptic forest setting of the film providing seating for visitors.

Drawing on the themes of youth, elemental power and ritual in their work, Webb-Ellis selected 22 other artist's films and digital installations from across the world to create the rest of the programme. Visitors are invited to explore generational traumas, passed on superstitions and ritualistic practices, and the idea of womanhood in different cultures; to reimagine a Soviet-era diving board as an antenna to signal other life forms and to manifest long-held childhood fantasies.

The 2022 *Visions* open call drew 448 submissions from 48 countries and collectively presents 42 artists hailing from 20 different countries across the globe, including China, Finland, Iran, Singapore and Ukraine. A much-anticipated exhibition in the Nunnery Gallery's calendar, *Visions* gives visitors the unique experience of a curated conversation of filmmakers from across the world.
